Commissioner Kammerzell ran the meeting and called the meeting to order at 10:00 am.

Commissioner and Staff Updates:

The first **WPPA Carbon meeting** was attended by Director Poire and he found it "interesting". He said there were talks from around the state on how the carbon tax would affect all and that this tax will be statewide, without an eastside/westside consideration. It will be a losing margin for the Port in that it "just can't quit carbon". It was mentioned that this may be an attempt to make up a statewide shortfall with loss in user fees and lower transport funds (one example being ferries running at only 40%). Joe reported that Steve Peterson (UI economist)) and Brian Craft (Director of business development in the College of Arts and Sciences at WSU) are working together on the **Washington Small Business**

Development Center (WSBDC) and will give an update in the next couple of weeks. The Port is working with the universities helping in small business development through this center. It was mentioned that the Port might want to consider having the Port's Communications Director Highfield help out with this project since there is no staff support at this time. The WSBDC did not get a grant to fund staff support and there are many things that need attention.

OLD BUSINESS:

Commissioner Appointment Process - Frank Chmelik called-in at 10:30 a.m.

WPPA Counsel Frank J. Chmelik reviewed best practices for **choosing a commissioner**. Any person interested in running can call him if they have questions about eligibly or the process itself. His phone number will be in the Port minutes. He reviewed the Code of Ethics for Municipal Officers and discussed situations where there may be conflict with the proper performance of duties in the public interest (Chapter 42.23 RCW). The process for the current commissioners to interview and decide on a candidate has to be open to the public though they are allowed to discuss the candidates privately amongst themselves. The position needs to be filled in 90 days of Commissioner Love's retirement or the county commissioners will fill the position. The selected candidate will serve out Commissioner Love's term until Nov. 2021 and will need to run in the next open election in November 2021 in order to retain the seat.

Lamont Library and Broadband Feed

There is an opportunity to link the NW corner of the county, between Rosalia and the County-owned tower approximately one mile outside of Lamont., with fiber service. Another aspect of the project is a shell building that Lamont built on a grant to be a library. The Port proposed the library building be a colocation for the library and the fiber termination hut. The Port will help in tying this project in with the other library CARES Act funding.

Pioneer Ports Meeting – Fall 2020 – Port of Whitman County

It is the Port of Whitman County's turn to host a Pioneer Ports (Port of Lewiston, Port of Whitman, and Port of Clarkston) meeting in September of 2020, not yet on the calendar. It was discussed to ask the Port of Lewiston to host the meeting because ID doesn't have the restrictions that WA does with regards to COVID and an outdoor venue could be chosen for this meeting. It would be an opportunity to introduce the new commissioner if held in October. The dates they are considering are Oct 19, 21 or 22.

2021 Port Insurance Update

The Port reviewed their 2021 insurance coverage with Enduris, checking for accuracy and updates. Enduris has not made an assessment of Port properties for 3 years and cannot do so now due to COVID restriction of no-travel. It is estimated that there will be an increase of 15.5% (2020:\$84,200 to 2021:\$97,232) in the cost of the policy. The Port made some adjustments on its own with increased values on some of its properties and this may lend to some of the increase in policy cost. Commissioner Kammerzell asked what other Ports do for their insurance. Director Poire stated some ports are self-insured, some are grouped with a private carrier which won't cover additional ports and about 50 ports are covered by Enduris. Director Poire said he would shop around but that it will take about a year to get another estimate. The Port carries separate insurances at Boyer for the Underground Fuel storage tank and airport insurance at POWBAC.

Grading of PIP West Port Retained Lots

The Port made a motion and approved to move forward with getting a bid from Syntier Engineering to grade, level and stabilize the Port retained lots at PIP West, 8.36 acres, for future Port or private sector development.

This is where the Breckenridge Group is starting to mobilize equipment onto their recently purchased lots for the Aspen Heights housing development. Since "they are moving lots of dirt" there anyway, the Port wanted to take advantage and move forward with their proposed project.

Little Goose and Lower Monumental Master Plan Comments

This topic was introduced in the regular meeting on 08-06-2020 which I missed. It concerns future land use around the Little Goose and Lower Monumental pools on the Snake River. Staff requested input from the Commissioners by 08-20-2020 as the deadline for submitting comments to USACE (United State Army Corps of Engineers) is on 08-21-2020. See original letter the Port received from the Corps below. There is a link to drafts of both the Little Goose and Lower Monumental Master Plans. The public comment period has passed.

The Port Properties & Development Manager Snell helped catch me up on this topic. The Port will be submitting comments one of which is that there is noticeable shrinkage of acreage at these sites and that the USACE should increase or at least maintain land for industrial or recreational use. The Port will mention that they are working with the Corps in a land trade north of Central Ferry, owned by the Port. The Port will also comment that they would like to see an extension and water rights at Boyer Park and Marina.

CARES Act Funds

Chief Operating Officer Riebold and Kristie Kirkpatrick, the Director at Whitman County Library, reached out to small towns with proposals for the utilization of CARES Act funds to support the library openings and education within the community.

The funds can be used for:

- Expenses for acquisition of protective supplies, including sanitizing products and personal protective equipment for library employees and patrons
- Expenses for disinfection of public areas and other facilities, including library facilities
- Expenses to facilitate distance learning, including technological improvements, in connection
 with school closings to enable compliance with COVID-19 precautions, (wireless hot spots in communities
 and additional equipment that could be distributed to facilitate distance learning)

CARES Act funding per town (\$25,000):

\$1000 - PPE for their libraries and towns: Cleaners/sanitizing supplies (hand sanitizing stations, refills, sprays, gloves, masks, towels, etc.), desk top plexiglass barrier for library (Steve's Glass)

\$5000 - Increased technology access for all ages: Computers for curbside service at libraries, filtering and administrative costs for tech support, curbside seating solutions, increased bandwidth speeds

\$19,000 - Increased technology access for students: Laptops, Chromebooks, wi-fi hotspots in cooperation with local school

Some of the towns include St John, Rosalia, Tekoa, Endicott, Garfield, Lamont, Malden, Farmington, LaCrosse, Oakesdale. These small-town libraries have many challenges. The Port will offer to assist in completing the paperwork required to access these funds and bridge funding if needed.

NEW BUSINESS:

2020 Quarter 2 Financials Report

Overall Port expenses are lower due to COVID. Office supplies and computer expenses are higher than budgeted for understandably. Full Financial report can be seen in the Port's meeting agenda on their website (link in the beginning of this report). Commissioner Meyer said they are "doing the right things at

the right time." Both Commissioners Kammerzell and Meyer complimented Finance Director Stav for improvements in the financials report and the additional footnotes.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Walla Walla District (Corps), invites your review of and comments on two revised draft Master Plans (MPs) with the associated draft Findings of No Significant Impact (FONSIs) and Environmental Assessments (EAs), pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. The 1966 Master Plan for Development and Management of Lower Monumental Reservoir and the 1969 Master Plan for Development and Management of Little Goose Reservoir are being updated to guide how the Corps manages federal lands relative to recreation, natural resources and cultural resources for the next 20 years. MPs do *not* address dam operations (e.g., spill, fish passage, or dam breaching), flood risk management (e.g., levees), or navigation.
