Reports:

a. There were no administrative reports this month.

Old business: Continue updating of the Whitman County Comprehensive Plan. The current Whitman County Comprehensive Plan was adopted in 1978. It is available at <u>Comprehensive Plan | Whitman County</u>, <u>WA</u>. The proposal is to go through the Plan line by line, chapter by chapter. This may require meeting the first and third Wednesday of the month. Chapter 1, the introduction, will be reviewed last since they will have a better picture of what the introduction should look like at the end of the process.

- 1. Starting at the **Economic Development** chapter
 - a. The commission discussed a number of wording changes in the introductory section.
 - b. The <u>large employer</u> data needs to be updated and verified through the Department of Labor Statistics. Alan will do this.
 - c. The <u>wages</u> section has an error: 'The median hourly wage in 2019 was \$23.60, which is less than the state's median hourly wage of \$23.14 (less King County).' The consultant will be asked to correct this.
 - d. The <u>tax sharing district</u> incudes a ring around Pullman and the Pullman Moscow corridor.
 - e. <u>Palouse Knowledge Corridor</u>: <u>what is rec-tech</u>? Robotic, Electronic and Computer technology.
 - f. There was a discussion of the challenge that the <u>county's agricultural economy</u> presents. While Pullman's economy has diversified, the unincorporated county is mostly agricultural and susceptible to climate change and market forces on commodities. Much of the language in this paragraph comes from the SEWDA strategic planning report.
 - g. Goals and Policies
 - i. ED 2.1 needs reworded. It implies we don't support businesses that aren't perceived as critical. Add 'all' businesses.
 - ii. Debbie Snell points out that <u>telecommunications infrastructure</u> needs to be developed throughout the county to move economic development forward in the small towns and unincorporated county. <u>Tourism</u> is also added to ED 3.1.
 - iii. There are provisions to ensure that <u>wind towers</u> will be built and make money so that property owners are not left with obligations.
 - iv. Dave Gibney questions why the plan would specify that 'Limit commercial growth in unincorporated rural communities to agriculturally-supportive and tourist/traveler supporting businesses...' This may be about water availability. Alan and Mark will reword to 'encourage more intensive industrial and manufacturing uses within urban areas and along the Pullman-Moscow Corridor.'
- 2. Next Chapter 6 is **Environmental Protection and Climate Change**. It was decided not to move to Chapter 6. Alan would like to schedule a second meeting on Dec 15 to move the Comprehensive Plan forward.

New Business

1. We have a new business agenda item this month to <u>elect a new chair and vice chair</u> of the planning commission.

- a. Chad Whetzel was nominated and elected to continue as chair
- b. Brian Davies was nominated and elected to continue as vice chair.
- c. A future agenda item will need to be to review the bylaws.
- d. Next project is to <u>update the Shoreline Master plan</u> which will be done jointly with the towns and the unincorporated county.
