Florence Nightingale Reenactment- Bobbie Ryder

On April 1, LWV of Pullman Celebrates Florence Nightingale's 200th Birthday (just a bit early)!

The birthday of the founder of modern nursing, Florence Nightingale (1820-1910), is celebrated each year on May 12, and this year she would turn 200. Not coincidently, this is also Nurses Week. To honor the extraordinary service of nurses and medical professionals during this past year, the League of Women Voters of Pullman is sponsoring a reenactment of Florence Nightingale, performed by Cathryn Cummings.

Cathryn Cummings grew up in Walla Walla, WA and holds a Doctor of Divinity from Princeton University. She is nationally recognized for her theatrical story telling. She is a featured speaker on Ted Talks and has created a one-woman show that tells the stories of five remarkable women in history that inspired her to be who she is. In this performance Cathryn will reenact Florence Nightingale.

Many know her as "the lady with the lamp," keeping watch over injured soldiers in the Crimean War in 1854. The war had been raging for a year, and newspaper reports of the terrible conditions for injured soldiers shocked the British public. Nightingale's party of nurses was sent to ease suffering in Crimea.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we are getting the timely reminder of the importance of Nightingale's work. As a leader of nurses she knew when to stand up for her nurses and patients. Nurses will fight to get the best resources they can for their team and the people they are looking after.

As with all meetings this year, the performance will be over Zoom and free to the public. The performance will begin at 7 pm on April 1st. The Zoom link can be found on the LWV of Pullman website <u>http://lwvpullman.org/</u>.



Pullman City Budget in the Year of Covid-19- Libby Walker

The presenter for the Brown Bag on April 20th will be City Administrator and Finance Director Mike Urban. Mike will discuss City income and expenses during the year ending December 31, 2020. There were many challenges given decreases in revenue from the lodging tax, real estate excise taxes, sales taxes, and utility fund revenues. He will explain what cuts were made in an attempt to balance the budget and the role played by CARES Act funding received by the City of Pullman. Predictions for 2021 may also be addressed.

Call to the May Annual Meeting

The Annual Business meeting will be on **Thursday, May 6 at 7:00-9:00pm on Zoom.** Our business meeting includes the election of officers, approval of next year's budget, discussion and approval of changes in several positions and the Bylaws and a proposal for an update study of our local libraries. All are very important for continuing our programs next year and none can happen without a quorum. The quorum is ¼ of our 69 members. **So we need at least 17 members attending! Please attend!** Following the business meeting President, Bobbie Ryder, will present a brief slide show of the highlights of the 2020-2021 Pullman League year. Hopefully, next year we will return to our tradition of a catered dinner and lots of socializing before the meeting.

A Selection of Memories

Palouse Regional Housing Study- Libby Walker

Brian Points, President of Points Consulting in Moscow, presented the Palouse Regional Housing Assessment which was completed in 2019 and included both Whitman and Latah Counties. Single family homes are still in short supply on the Palouse, and the study recommended large scale single family housing developments. The Pullman City Council moved to approve the Canyon Crest Planned Residential Development which involves 75 lots on 10.3 acres near Kamiak Elementary School. 68 homes from 1,000-2,000 square feet will be built; none will have garages but there will be covered parking stalls.

Assessing League Impacts in Washington State- Libby Walker

Nicholas Lovrich and Francis Benjamin were guest speakers at the February brown bag meeting. The concept of "appreciative inquiry" will be used in a survey to determine the positive aspects of the League of Women Voters in Washington State with questions such as: "What brought you to the League?" and

"What are the values that motivate you?" Nicholas Lovrich, Professor Emeritus of Political Science at WSU and Francis Benjamin, Director of the Political Interaction Lab in the WSU Department of Psychology are the lead investigators on this project. They will coordinate with the League of Women Voters of Washington Research Team. Phase One includes a survey of 130 current League members. Phase Two involves developing a survey which will be distributed to all 2700 League members throughout the state. Phase Three includes surveying external agencies and stakeholders. The goal is to create a publishable paper which will be the first in the U.S. to measure the influence of a state League of Women Voters.

Meeting Content:

The meeting was called to order with whole board in attendance. Motions were made and seconded to pass the February Minutes, claims for past three months, and March Salary warrants.

Ann Parks reported that the City Council was very impressed with the organizational procedures and goal setting during the pandemic and in the first steps to reopen. Well Done!

Joanna Bailey, Library Director, reported that the Friends of the Library are currently planning a Book Sale in the Parking lot. Multiple boxes of books will be available in numerous ways including possibly 'fill a bag'. Still in early planning stages. Left over books will be distributed to libraries; schools and finally thrift shops. Currently library is not taking any discarded books.

It was reported that 18.34% of this year's budget has been spent; materials and activities will be included in the 2nd guarter.

See the **attached Director's report**: Highlights: The library is open and have already increased to 50 % occupancy or 40 people. Most people come at 4 pm with the least people accessing from 5–6 pm making that a good time to go to the library. Curbside is now open from 11:30 am—5:30 pm. Grab and Go Bags are very popular with 100 a week. They have been for everyone, but March will be for Teens Only. Downloadable books are becoming more popular with Teens. Library waiting for stage three re-opening. Two library developments were mentioned: Revenue for materials will be coming in the amount of \$16,000 and funding for maintenance in form of Janitorial service and additional cleaning needs (pandemic driven). The subcommittee to review the Director was appointed: Dan LaBeau and Brandon Wolking.
